STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SEVEN

AN ACT Relating to Contracts by Corporate Public Utilities with Holding Corporations and with Associated Subsidiary Corporations.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

No corporate public utility doing business in this state shall

- 2 make any contract for services to be rendered in respect
- 3 of management, operating functions, the purchasing, sell-
- 4 ing or marketing of its product, the purchasing of materials
- 5 or supplies, or the furnishing of professional services with
- 6 any corporation holding, controlling, owning or having any
- 7 direct or indirect interest in a majority of either the voting
- 8 capital stock or the common capital stock of said public
- 9 utility; or with any other corporation which is itself owned

10 or controlled directely or indirectly by a corporation hold-11 ing, owning, controlling or having any direct or indirect 12 interest in a majority of either the voting capital stock or 13 the common capital stock of such public utility; unless pre-14 viously to the execution of said contract, written approval 15 shall have been granted, after hearing, by the public utili-16 ties commission.

The provisions of this act shall not apply to steam railroad 2 corporations engaged in interstate commerce whose similar 3 contracts or whose expenditures under such contracts are 4 subject to the jurisdiction of the interstate commerce com-5 mission.
