IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SEVEN

AN ACT to Provide State Aid for Academies, Institutes, Seminaries and Junior Colleges.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows: Section 1. Sections 98, 99, 100, 101, 102, 103 and 104 of 2 the revised statutes are hereby amended by striking out 3 said sections and inserting in place thereof the following: 'Sect. 2. Definition. Whenever in this act the word "acad-2 emy" occurs it shall be construed to mean also "seminary," 3 "institute," or "junior college" as their terms are common-4 ly accepted in this state and shall be in academic instruc-5 tion beyond the elementary school—but shall not repre-6 sent a full college course, and shall be operating under pri-7 vate charter.

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Sect. 3. Must meet requirements of commissioner of edu-2 cation. Each and every institution which shares in the bene-3 fits of the funds provided in this act shall meet the require-4 ments and standards for the approval of free public high 5 schools in courses of study, methods of instruction, essential 6 equipment, number and certification of teachers, and shall 7 be approved by the state commissioner of education.

Sect. 4. Institutions receiving aid shall report to commis-2 sioner of education. Every educational institution receiving 3 state aid and the officers of every academy sharing in the 4 benefits as provided herein, and every school or academy 5 approved for tuition purposes shall, annually, on or before 6 the first of August of each year, report to the commissioner 7 of education on forms provided by him, the number of 8 students, both residents of the state and otherwise, their 9 attendance, an account of all moneys received and expended 10 during the preceding year, the number and names of in-11 structors and such other items as may be required from 12 time to time. Every such institution failing to comply with 13 the requirements herein shall forfeit whatever state aid or 14 assistance it would otherwise receive.

Sec. 5. Requirements for state aid. For each teaching 2 position filled by a legally qualified teacher the institution 3 shall receive annually one hundred dollars. Provided all 4 students are residents of the state or for such proportion 5 as such students are of the total number in average daily 6 attendance. Academies with not less than thirty nor more 7 than sixty students in daily attendance shall receive twenty 8 dollars per student. Academies with more than sixty and 9 not more than one hundred shall receive ten dollars per 10 student on actual attendance and all academies with more 11 than one hundred students shall receive three dollars per 12 capita on attendance; all such institutions as meet these re-13 quirements shall receive the same per diem on aggregate 14 attendance as is accorded the free public high schools. Pro-15 vided also that only students who are residents of this state 16 shall be reckoned in these awards.

Sect. 6. Students must present certificates of qualifica-2 tions. When students register for the first time in any 3 academy which is to share in the benefits of this act, or to 4 receive tuition from public funds, each student must pre-5 sent a certificate from the superintendent of the town of 6 which said student is a resident, stating that the work as 7 required by the elementary schools of the town has been 8 completed in satisfactory manner.

Sect. 7. Special provisions. (a) No academy shall share 2 in the benefits of this act unless established prior to July 3 first, nineteen hundred twenty. (b) The minimum award 4 under the provisions of this act shall be eight hundred dol-5 lars and maximum amount shall be twenty-five hundred, 6 provided these amounts shall not include any award from 7 the provisions for equalization. (c) No academy shall re-8 ceive state aid which does not maintain an average of thirty 9 students who are residents of this state. Provided the comSENATE-No. 140

10 missioner of education may with the approval of the gov-11 ernor and council make such award to any academy which 12 is deemed of special service and which may have fewer 13 students, but such award shall not exceed five hundred dol-(d) Any academy which receives special appropria-14 lars. 15 tion from the legislature for any year shall become thereby 16 ineligible to share in the benefits of this act for that year. 17 (e) No academy shall receive more than one-half of its re-18 quired funds from state aid. (f) No academy shall receive 19 aid as provided herein if said academy has an annual in-20 come from vested funds exceeding three thousand dollars, 21 but may receive an award from the academy equalization 22 fund if it is recommended by the commissioner of educa-23 tion and approved by the governor and council, and the 24 condition of its funds are deemed inadequate to maintain 25 a required efficiency. But no institution shall during any 26 year receive more than one thousand dollars from such fund.

Sect. 8. Academy Equalization Fund. In order to facili-2 tate the welfare of such academies as are contemplated in 3 this act there is hereby established an annual equalization 4 fund of five thousand dollars, which may be apportioned 5 in amounts not exceeding one thousand dollars in any one 6 academy for any one year. Whenever it shall appear from 7 the reports, financial and statistical, and from such investi-8 gation as the commissioner of education shall make, either 9 personally or by assistants, that any academy is in special 10 need and especially for the encouragement of junior col11 leges, the commissioner of education may recommend such12 amounts as he may deem necessary within the limits herein13 prescribed and upon approval of the governor and council14 an award may be made in the manner herein prescribed.

Sect. 9. *Mode of payment*. The governor and council 2 may draw warrants on the treasurer of state for the annual 3 payments to the legal representatives of such academies as 4 meet the provisions of this act, such payments and awards 5 at the times and in the manner provided by law for the pay-6 ment of money in aiding public schools, of the amounts to 7 which they are severally entitled. Provided that no pay-8 ment or award shall be made to any academy until the com-9 missioner of education shall have certified to the governor 10 and council all of the facts which by law are made neces-11 sary to entitle an academy to receive state **aid**.
