STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SEVEN

RESOLVE to Reimburse Cumberland County Fish and Game Association for One-half the Amount Expended in Screening Peabody Pond in the County of Cumberland.

Resolved: That the sum of three hundred and twenty-2 five dollars be, and hereby is, appropriated, to be paid to 3 the Cumberland County Fish and Game Association to 4 reimburse said association for one-half the amount expended 5 from its treasury on account of screening Peabody Pond in 6 the county of Cumberland.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

The 81st Legislature appropriated the sum of one hundred dollars in aid of a proposed screen at Peabody Pond, the plan at that time calling for a simple structure at the old outlet dam. Plans were changed and it was decided to establish the structure in a more advantageous place, requiring a long stone and cement dam and a wide iron screen. This structure was built in the fall of 1925 and paid for from the treasury of the Cumberland County Fish and Game Association, and it was too late to make available the appropriation from the state.

In 1926 it was found that the structure was not high enough to take care of extremely high waters in the pond and in the fall of 1926 additions to the top and wings were started and these changes are very nearly completed, the cost of which is estimated by the mason at about three hundred and twenty-five dollars.

Peabody Pond is located in the towns of Sebago, Naples and Bridgton and, after much study was determined upon as an unusual natural trout water. It has been developed under the auspices of the Cumberland County Fish and Game Association and the State Department of Inland Fisheries and Game as a characteristic trout pond.
