STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND TWENTY-NINE

RESOLVE, to Reimburse the Town of Caribou for Support
of Evelyn Kinney and Children, State Paupers.

Resolved: That there be, and hereby is, appropriated to
2 be paid to the town of Caribou, the sum of one hundred
3 thirty-six dollars and eighty-nine cents, to reimburse said
4 town for money expended for support of Evelyn Kinney
5 and children, state paupers.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

This woman married Christopher Kinney of Caribou on September 11, 1926, and they separated on September 11, 1927. Since that time Mrs. Kinney and her children by a former husband were supported at the expense of the town of Caribou until they left for parts unknown. Mrs. Kinney had been married twice before she married Mr. Kinney. Her first husband was Thomas E. Heath of Wolfeboro, N. H. After his death, she married a man named Frank Gray in Wakefield, N. H. Her third husband, Mr. Kinney, refused to pay her bills, because it was claimed that she had never obtained a divorce from the previous husband, and that the last marriage was, therefore, illegal. She claimed that she was divorced, but never was able to present any proof of such divorce. Her maiden name was Evelyn Clough; she was the daughter of Herbert S. Clough of Tamworth, N. H.
