STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-NINE

RESOLVE, to Reimburse the Town of Addison for Burial Expenses of George M. Guptill, a Person Having no Known Settlement in the State.

Resolved: That there be, and hereby is, appropriated to

- 2 be paid to the town of Addison, the sum of forty-eight dol-
- 3 lars and forty-five cents, to reimburse said town for money
- 4 expended for burial expenses of George M. Guptill, a per-
- 5 son having no known settlement in the state.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

George M. Guptill died in the town of Addison early in the year 1928. He was born in the town of Steuben on January 2, 1881. His sister, who lives at Winter Hill, Massachusetts, claims that he lived at Newton, Massachusetts, for five years. There is no other information as to the exact time he was in Massachusetts; if he lived there five years, he lost any settlement which he may have had in the state of Maine; otherwise, he did not. The chairman of the selectmen of the town of Addison states that Mr. Guptill returned to Columbia Falls, Maine, on October 10, 1924, and to the town of Addison in the month of October, 1927. He certainly did not acquire any new settlement after coming back from Massachusetts. His father, who lives at Hempstead, New York, paid \$35.00 on account of the bill, but the selectmen of Addison have been unable to collect any more from him.
