STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND TWENTY-NINE

AN ACT Relative to Close Time on Wild Hares or Rabbits.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section forty-nine, chapter two hundred nineteen, public
2 laws nineteen hundred seventeen, as amended by chapter
3 fifty-three, public laws nineteen hundred twenty-three, and
4 chapter sixty-nine, public laws nineteen hundred twenty-
5 five, and chapter one hundred twelve, public laws nineteen
6 hundred twenty-seven, is hereby further amended by strik-
7 ing out the word "Cumberland" in the sixth line of said
8 section, and by inserting said word 'Cumberland,' after the
9 word "Sagadahoc" in the second line of said section, so
10 that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 49. There shall be an annual closed season on wild
2 hares or rabbits, in the counties of Androscoggin, Sagada-
3 hoc, Cumberland and York, during the months of March,
4 April, May, June, July, August and September of each
5 year, and in the counties of Aroostook, Washington, Han-
6 cock, Penobscot, Piscataquis, Somerset, Franklin, Oxford,
7 Kennebec, Knox, Lincoln and Waldo during the months
8 of April, May, June, July, August and September of each
9 year, during which respective closed seasons it shall be un-
10 lawful for any person to hunt, kill, catch, pursue or have
11 any rabbits or parts thereof in possession, except alive.'
