STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-NINE

AN ACT in Relation to the Maine School for the Deaf.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:
Section 1. The Maine school for the deaf, established by
2 chapter four hundred and forty-six, of the private and
3 special laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, is to be
4 devoted to the education and instruction of deaf and dumb
5 children.

Sect. 2. Said school shall be located at Portland, in the 2 county of Cumberland, and the state shall hereafter assume 3 the entire charge, responsibility and expense of maintaining 4 said school.

Sect. 3. The government of said school is hereby vested 2 in a board of five trustees, to be appointed by the governor 3 with the advice and consent of the council, to hold office for 4 a term of five years, provided, however, that trustees now 5 holding office shall continue therein until their respective 6 terms shall have expired.

Sect. 4. The trustees shall have charge of the general in-2 terests of said school and see that its affairs are conducted 3 in accordance with law. They may employ officers, teach-4 ers and other employees as they may deem advisable and 5 fix the compensation of the same subject to the approval 6 of the governor and council; they may from time to time 7 prescribe the system of education and course of study to 8 be pursued in the school and shall be allowed for their ser-9 vices, their actual expenses and five dollars a day when 10 actually employed.

Sect. 5. With the consent of its parent or guardian, the 2 trustees may admit to said school for a term not exceeding 3 twelve years, any deal and dumb child residing in this state 4 and not less than five years of age, who shall not be with-5 drawn or discharged from said school, except with the con-6 sent of the trustees or the governor and council, and the 7 sums necessary for the support and instruction of such 8 children while attending said school, shall be paid by the 9 state.

Sect. 6. Deaf and dumb children residing in other states 2 may at the discretion of the trustees be admitted to said

3 school upon the payment by their parents, guardian or other 4 responsible agency of a reasonable compensation to be fixed 5 by the trustees. All income from this or any other source 6 shall be paid to the treasurer of state and shall be added 7 to the appropriation for the maintenance of said school and 8 the same is hereby appropriated for said purpose.

Sect. 7. So much of chapter four hundred and forty-2 six, of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred and 3 ninety-seven as is inconsistent with this act is hereby re-4 pealed.
