**IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE  
HUNDRED AND TWENTY-NINE**

AN ACT Relating to Sealers of Weights and Measures.

---

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section twenty-three of chapter one hundred and eighteen  
2 of the revised statutes is hereby amended by striking out  
3 all of said section and inserting in place thereof the follow-  
4 ing section:

‘Sect. 23. The fees of sealers of weights and measures,  
2 for testing and adjusting scales, weights and measures by  
3 the town standard, to be paid by the persons for whom  
4 the service is rendered, are as follows: for testing railroad  
5 track scales of forty thousand pounds capacity and up-

6 wards, four dollars; elevator scales of twenty thousand  
7 pounds capacity and upwards one dollar and fifty cents;  
8 platform scales of five thousand pounds capacity and up-  
9 wards, one dollar; dormant scales of less than five thousand  
10 pounds capacity, fifty cents; dormant beef track scales,  
11 fifty cents; platform scales of less than five thousand pounds  
12 capacity, fifty cents; beam scales of over one thousand  
13 pounds capacity, fifty cents; platform scales of less than  
14 one thousand pounds capacity, twenty-five cents; platform  
15 counter scales, twenty-five cents; counter balance or trip  
16 scales, twenty-five cents; spring balance scales, twenty-five  
17 cents; weights, each, three cents; measures, wet and dry,  
18 each, three cents; yard sticks, each, five cents; coal baskets,  
19 each ten cents; milk cans, large size, five cents each; milk  
20 cans, small size, three cents each; milk bottles, in lots of  
21 one gross or less, one cent each; in lots from one to two  
22 gross, three-fourths of a cent each, in lots of more than  
23 two gross and not over four gross, one-half cent each, in  
24 lots greater than four gross, one fourth of a cent each; for  
25 testing gasoline pumps not over five gallon capacity, fifty  
26 cents; for testing gasoline pumps of not over ten gallon  
27 capacity, one dollar; for testing gasoline pumps of more  
28 than ten gallon capacity, one dollar and fifty cents; for  
29 taxicab meters, one dollar; for gasoline meters, fifty cents;  
30 for fabric measuring devices, twenty-five cents; for vehicle  
31 tanks, one dollar for first hundred gallons, and one dollar  
32 for each additional one hundred gallons; for adjusting

33 weights when either light or heavy, not to exceed ten cents  
34 each; for adjusting measures, wet or dry, when either large  
35 or small, not to exceed ten cents each; for adjusting yard  
36 sticks, not to exceed five cents each; for adjusting any  
37 weight or measure not mentioned above, a fair and reason-  
38 able compensation.'
