STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND TWENTY-NINE

AN ACT to Amend Section Fourteen of Chapter 219 of the
Public Laws of 1917.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section fourteen of chapter two hundred nineteen of the
2 public laws of nineteen hundred seventeen is hereby amend-
3 ed by striking out in the third line thereof the words "in a
4 book kept for that purpose," so that said section as amended
5 shall read as follows:

'Sect. 14. No person shall engage in the business of guid-
2 ing, either for inland fishing or forest or shore hunting,
3 until he has caused his name, age and residence to be re-
4 corded by the commissioners of inland fisheries and game

5 and has procured a certificate from said commissioners, set-
6 ting forth in substance that he is deemed suitable to act as
7 such guide, under a penalty of fifty dollars and costs for
8 each offense. Each registered guide shall, from time to
9 time, as often as requested by the commissioners, forward,
10 on blanks furnished him by the commissioners, a statement
11 of the number of persons he has guided in inland fishing
12 and forest and shore hunting during the time called for in
13 said statement, the number of days he has been employed
14 as a guide, and such other useful information relative to
15 inland fish and game, forest fires, and the preservation of
16 the forests in the localities where he has guided, as the com-
17 missioners may deem of importance to the state, under a
18 penalty of fifty dollars for unreasonably or wilfully refusing
19 to comply with these requirements.'
