STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND THIRTY-ONE

AN ACT Relative to Fur-Bearing Animals.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section seventy-two of chapter thirty-eight of the revised statutes, as amended by chapter three hundred sixty-eight of the public laws of the special session of nineteen hundred thirty, is hereby amended by striking out in the seventh line thereof the word "Waldo", and by inserting in the eleventh line thereof, after the word "Hancock", the word 'Waldo' so that the first paragraph of said section seventy-two, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 72. Trapping season regulated with reference to counties. Whoever from the first day of February to the fifteenth day of November, both days inclusive, hunts or traps any fur-bearing animal except wild hares and rabbits (which are protected under the provisions of section thirty-nine of this chapter), bobcats, loupcevier, Canada lynx, or muskrat, within the counties of Androscoggin, Cumberland, York, Sagadahoc, Kennebec, Lincoln, and Knox; or whoever from the first day of February to the fifteenth day of October, both days inclusive, hunts or traps any fur-bearing animal except wild hares and rabbits (which are protected as aforesaid), bobcats, loupcevier, Canada lynx, or muskrat, within the counties of Washington, Hancock, Waldo, Aroostook, Penobscot, Pis-

cataquis, Franklin, Somerset, and Oxford; or whoever has in possession at any time any fur-bearing animal or part or parts thereof taken in closed season, shall be subject to the penalties of this chapter.'
