STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-ONE

RESOLVE Creating an Old Age Pension Recess Committee.

Resolved: That the governor with the advice and consent of the council shall appoint five citizens of the state, one of whom shall be a member of the minority party of the state and one a member of and representing the State Grange, which shall be known as the "Committee on Old Age Pensions."

Said commissioners shall serve without pay but shall be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. As soon as convenient after their appointment they shall meet and choose a chairman and secretary.

It shall be the duty of the commission to consult old age pension laws wherever known to exist and also secure information regarding the subject from every other source obtainable; after obtaining such information it shall be the duty of the commission to formulate an "Old Age Pension Act," which in its opinion will be best adapted for Maine and present the same to the eighty-sixth legislature with its recommendations, a copy of which shall be transmitted to the governor, and be it further RESOLVED, That the sum of one thousand dollars, (\$1000) be and hereby is appropriated for the carrying out the provisions of this resolve and for legal advice; provided, however, that if the eighty-sixth legislature should enact an old age pension law this resolve shall be null and void.
