STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND THIRTY-ONE

AN ACT Relating to the Purposes for which Towns and
Cities May Raise Money.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 78 of Chapter 5 of the Revised Statutes is amended by inserting after the word "poor" in the third line thereof, the words 'and for scouting education', so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

'Sec. 78. Purposes for which money may be raised. R. S. c. 4, sec. 57. The voters, at a legal town meeting, may raise the necessary sums for the support of schools and the poor, and for scouting education; making and repairing highways, town ways, and bridges; and sprinkling streets; acquiring by purchase or otherwise suitable sites, or suitable sites and buildings, or erecting buildings for free public libraries; purchasing and fencing burying-grounds; maintaining private burying-grounds established before eighteen hundred eighty; purchasing or building and repairing a hearse and hearse-house for the exclusive use of its citizens; and for other necessary town charges.'
