STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND THIRTY-ONE

AN ACT Relating to the Digging of Clams in the Town of
Kennebunk.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. Digging of clams in Kennebunk limited. It shall be unlawful for any person not an inhabitant of the State of Maine, or not a temporary resident of the town of Kennebunk, in the County of York, to dig clams within said town of Kennebunk; such inhabitants of said State of Maine and temporary residents of the town of Kennebunk shall dig not more than one half bushel in any one day for home consumption, within this state.

Sec. 2. Inhabitants only may dig clams for commercial purposes. No person, not an inhabitant of said town of Kennebunk, shall dig clams for commercial purposes within said town.

Sec. 3. Clam hoe must be used. No clams shall be dug within the limits of said town of Kennebunk other than with a clam hoe.

Sec. 4. Penalties. Whoever violates the provisions of this act, for each offense, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.
