AN ACT to Authorize the Treasurer of State to Receive a  
Portion of the Residue of the Estate of Joseph C. Greene,  
Bequeathed to the Pownal State School.

---

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

The treasurer of state is hereby authorized to receive from the executors of the will of Joseph C. Greene late of Auburn, Maine, one-third of the residue of his estate, which was bequeathed to the Pownal State School, to be held by said treasurer of state for the use of said Pownal State School, the principal to become a part of the permanent funds of said institution and the income to be used for the purposes for which said institution was organized and is now carried on and operated, and said treasurer of state, upon receipt of said bequest, he is hereby authorized and empowered to execute and deliver proper receipts thereafter.
