STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-ONL

AN ACT Relating to Subordinate Officers of the House of Representatives

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section I. Section thirty-eight of chapter two of the revised statutes is hereby amended by adding to the end thereof the following, 'after the election of the Speaker, the House of Representatives shall proceed to elect by ballot a Clerk, an Assistant Clerk, a Sergeant at Arms, an Assistant Sergeant at Arms, a Document Clerk, a Doorkeeper and two Pages.'

Sec. 2. Section twelve of chapter one hundred twenty-five of the revised statutes is hereby amended by striking out all of said section and inserting in place thereof the following:

'Sec. 12. The Clerk of the House of Representatives shall perform the usual duties of his office during the session of the legislature and index the house journal. He shall also perform the services required of him by sections thirty-eight and forty-one of chapter two. He shall receive a salary of two thousand dollars in full for all official services by him performed during the regular session of the legislature.

The assistant clerk of the house shall receive a salary of twelve hundred dollars; his work shall be performed under the direction of the clerk. The official reporter of the house shall receive a salary of seventeen hundred fifty dollars.

The sergeant at arms shall receive a salary of six hundred dollars.

The assistant sergeant at arms shall receive a salary of four hundred fifty dollars.

The document clerk shall receive a salary of five hundred dollars.

The doorkeeper shall receive a salary of three hundred dollars.

The pages shall receive a salary of three hundred dollars, each.

The document clerk, doorkeeper and pages shall perform their duties under the direction of the Sergeant at arms.

The above salaries shall be in full for all official services performed during the regular session of the legislature, and no other compensation shall be allowed them, except in case of an adjourned or special session of the legislature.'
