## STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED THIRTY-THREE

AN ACT Relative to Definitions of Hunting, Resident, Aliens, Jack-light and Trapping.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. R. S. c. 38, § 40, ¶ b, amended. Paragraph (b) of section 40 of chapter 38 of the revised statutes is hereby repealed and the following enacted in place thereof:

'For the purposes of this chapter all aliens shall be classified as non-residents, except that, any alien who has lived in the state continuously for 2 years and in addition thereto pays tax on real estate in the city or town in which he resides, may purchase any resident license issued under the provisions of this chapter, except that, guides' licenses shall be issued only to citizens of the United States.'

Sec. 2. R. S. c. 38, § 40, additional Section 40 of chapter 38 of the revised statutes, is amended by adding thereto the following paragraph (e).

'A resident is a citizen of the United States who has been a bona fide resident of this state and actually domiciled here for a period of 3 months next prior to his application for a license.'
