STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED THIRTY-
THREE

RESOLVE, for State Pension in Favor of Mary Barton Redlon, of
Augusta.

Pension provided for Mary Barton Redlon. Resolved: That a pension be and hereby is granted to Mary Barton Redlon, of Augusta, Maine, in the sum of \$20 per month to be paid quarterly from the funds for pensions for soldiers and their dependents. Said pension shall begin on July 1st, 1933 and shall continue until otherwise provided by the legislature.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

Mary Barton Redlon was born August 26, 1850. She is the daughter of the late Joseph Law Jr., who enlisted in the 7th New Jersey Regiment under the command of Fighting Joe Hooker and served in the United States Army during the Civil War. He was a private in Company F, New Jersey Volunteers. He enlisted September 2, 1861 and was discharged at Convalescent Camp, Alexandria, Virginia, November 12, 1862.

Joseph Law was a resident of Maine at the time of his death, having moved to this State from New Jersey in 1873.

Mrs. Redlon is a soldier's daughter in distress and requires much care and attention. For the past 24 years she has been a shut-in. Six years ago she was moved from Portland to Augusta. She requires much care day and night, and resides at 7 Perham Street, Augusta, Maine, and is being cared for by Miss Margaret Soule.
