STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED THIRTY-THREE

AN ACT Relating to Town Meetings.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 5, § 4, amended. Section 4 of chapter 5 of the revised statutes is hereby amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 4. Selectmen refusing, meeting how called. If the selectmen unreasonably refuse to call a town meeting, any ten or more number of legal voters therein not less than 10% of the voters registered in the biennial state election than last past, but in no case less than 10 so registered voters, may apply, in writing, to a justice of the peace in the county, who may issue his warrant for calling such meeting. When ten or more any number of legal voters not less than 10% of the voters registered in the biennial state election than last past but in no case less than 10 so registered voters request the selectmen, in writing, to insert a particular thing article in a warrant, they shall insert it in the next warrant issued, or shall call a special meeting for the consideration thereof.'
