S T A T E O F M A I N E

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED THIRTY-THREE

RESOLVE, in Favor of the Town of Veazie to Reimburse said Town of Veazie for Support of Archie L. Mishio and Family, State Paupers.

Town of Veazie, reimbursed. Resolved: That there be and hereby is appropriated to be paid to the town of Veazie the sum of \$603.43, being the amount already expended by said town of Veazie for the support of Archie L. Mishio and family, state paupers.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

Archie L. Mishio, wife and children, do now reside in the town of Veazie, he the said Mishio having been born in Greenbush, Maine, and at the time of the commencement of support rendered him by said Veazie he was a minor under the age of 21 years. His mother is dead and his father, Arthur L. Mishio, lives at Rockwood, Maine, an unorganized township, where the father has lived for a number of years, having gone to Rockwood in 1927, and remained there continuously ever since, and has never been back to live at Greenbush at all during the past eight years. Therefore it will appear that the father, having resided in an unincorporated place for five consecutive years outside the town of Greenbush, has lost his pauper settlement in said town of Greenbush. It will be made to appear that the father during the above period has never received pauper supplies from any source within the state, and that the said Archie Mishio, being a minor, has no pauper settlement in any town within the state, as he has never lived for five consecutive years in any town since he left the town of Greenbush. His mother died at Rockwood, and he has never lived with his father at all since the death of his mother.

Therefore, it would seem that under the provisions of chapter 124 of the laws of 1931 that said Archie L. Mishio and those dependent upon him are state paupers.
