STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED
THIRTY-FIVE

AN ACT Relating to Confessions and Admissions in Criminal Cases.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Suspected criminals need not be warned of their rights. No person need be warned of his rights before making a confession or an admission to render such confession or admission admissible in evidence and whether or not there was such warning may not be inquired into in the trial of a criminal cause.
