STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED
THIRTY-FIVE

AN ACT to Repeal Acts Incorporating the Town of Concord.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. Incorporation of Concord, repealed. All acts heretofore enacted for the incorporation of the town of Concord, in the county of Somerset, are hereby repealed; provided, that the corporate existence, powers, duties and liabilities of said town shall survive for the purpose of prosecuting and defending all actions and causes of action to which such town is a party, and collecting payment of all claims and demands now existing in favor of or against said town, and all needful processes growing out of the same.

Sec. 2. Newly organized plantation may take over liabilities and claims. In case a plantation is organized within the territory and embracing the limits of such town of Concord, such plantation may, at a meeting legally called by a warrant and containing an article for that purpose, by vote, assume all the outstanding liabilities of such town on the day when this act takes effect, and in case such plantation so votes, they shall have authority to raise money by loan upon plantation orders or notes, which shall be valid claims upon such plantation, with which to discharge such liabilities, and thereupon all the property and assets of such town shall become the property of and vested in such plantation.
