STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED THIRTY-FIVE

AN ACT Relating to Lights on Trucks.

Amend said Bill by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the following:

Lights on trucks, regulated. The first sentence of the fifth paragraph of section 82 of chapter 29 of the revised statutes is hereby repealed and the following inserted in place thereof:

'All motor vehicles of 7 feet or over in width shall have thereon, in addition to the lights required by law for vehicles of less width, a green or amber light attached to the extreme left of the front of such vehicle, so attached and adjusted as to indicate the extreme left lateral extension of the vehicle or load which shall in all cases aforesaid be visible not less than 200 feet in the direction towards which the vehicle is proceeding or facing; provided, however, that any such vehicle eight feet or more in height shall display two such green or amber lights attached to the extreme left of the front of its body as above provided, one at the top and the other at the bottom of said body; and every such motor vehicle shall display at least one red light on the extreme left lateral extension of the vehicle or load on the rear of said vehicle; provided, however, that any such vehicle eight feet or more in height shall display two red lights on the extreme left lateral extension of its body or load, one on the upper left and the other on the lower left of the rear of said body or load.'
