### AN ACT Relative to Game Preserve in Penobscot County.

---

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows :

**R. S., c. 38, § 90, amended.** Section 90 of chapter 38 of the revised statutes as revised is hereby amended by adding thereto the following paragraph :

‘No person shall at any time hunt, chase, catch, kill or destroy any wild bird or wild animal within the limits of the following described tract or territory situated in Penobscot county, to wit: beginning at mean low-water mark on the westerly bank of the Stillwater river at the point where the town line separating Old Town from Orono touches the bank of said river, and proceeding in a generally westerly direction along said town line about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile to the point where it crosses Stillwater avenue, so-called; thence generally southerly along said Stillwater avenue about 1 mile to the point where said Stillwater avenue is crossed by the Glenburn road, so-called; thence generally easterly along said Glenburn road about  $1\frac{1}{4}$  miles to its intersection with Bennoch street, so-called; thence continuing across said Bennoch street in the same general direction as along the Glenburn road to the westerly bank of the Stillwater river; thence generally northerly along the westerly bank of said Stillwater river about 1 mile to the point of beginning.’
