S T A T E O F M A I N E

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED
THIRTY-NINE

AN ACT Relative to Game Preserve in Phippsburg, county of Sagadahoc.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

§

R. S., c. 38, additional. Chapter 38 of the revised statutes, as revised, is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered 89-D and to read as follows:

‘Sec. 89-D. Phippsburg game preserve, established. No person shall at any time, hunt, chase, catch, kill or destroy any wild bird or wild animal within the following described territory known as Morse’s Mountain, situated in the town of Phippsburg, in the county of Sagadahoc; commencing at a marked fir tree by the mouth of a brook in the “Old Shipyard”; thence running westwardly in a direct line to a hole drilled in a ledge in the middle mountain road; thence northwardly by said road to 3 holes drilled in a ledge; thence northwestwardly to a pile of stones near a spotted tree; thence northwardly by lands now or formerly of the heirs of Washington Gilbert, John McIntyre and Tallman Lowell, to the “Great Marsh”; thence southwardly and westwardly by said marsh to Sprague’s river; thence by the thread of said river to a rock therein, below the “Old Carting Place”; thence southeastwardly by the land of Bodwell and Spinney to “Sea Wall Beach” at the east end of the first sand hummock; thence

by said beach and base of the "Little Mountain" at high water mark to "Cherry Tree Head"; thence to Morse's river and by the thread of said river to the point of beginning.

The provisions of this act shall take and continue in effect, when said territory shall have been surrounded by a single strand of wire and plainly posted and while the vermin thereon is kept under control, all at the expense of the owners thereof.'
