IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED
THIRTY-NINE

AN ACT to Authorize the Construction of a Bridge Across the Kennebec River.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. State highway commission authorized to construct bridge. The state highway commission is hereby authorized and directed to construct a bridge across the Kennebec river from a point either in Augusta on the west shore to a point in Augusta on the east shore, or from a point in Hallowell on the west shore to a point in Chelsea on the east shore, the exact location to be determined by the state highway commission, after a study of existing traffic routes, that may be considered by said commission to be most advantageous for through traffic to other sections of the state and to the citizens of the cities of Augusta and Hallowell and to the towns of Chelsea and Manchester, and to construct or reconstruct such connecting highways to existing routes as may be necessary.

Sec. 2. Provisions for financing bridge and connecting highways. The state highway commission is hereby authorized to expend such sums of money as may be necessary to construct the bridge and connecting highways described in section 1 as may be authorized by the legislature for this purpose, either through bond issues or appropriations or from any other funds which may be made available through any other sources.
