STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED FORTY-ONE

AN ACT Relating to the Attorney-General and the Justices.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

- R. S., c. 125, § 6, amended. Section 6 of chapter 125 of the revised statutes, as amended by chapter 94 of the public laws of 1931, is hereby further amended to read as follows:
- 'Sec. 6. The attorney-general. The attorney-general shall have an office in the state capitol and shall receive an annual salary of four thousand dollars \$6000, in full for all services and in lieu of all fees, except costs awarded under section six of chapter seventy-seven. He shall receive his actual expenses incurred in the performance of his official duties while away from his home. During his or their incumbency in office, neither the attorney-general nor any active or active-retired justice of the superior or supreme judicial courts shall serve as director of any corporation doing business in this state, and subject to the laws thereof. This provision shall not apply to the directorates of corporations organized for purely charitable, religious or educational purposes.'
