IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED FORTY-ONE

AN ACT Regarding Notices on Applications for Malt Liquor Licenses.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

P. L., 1937, c. 237, § 25, amended. Section 25 of chapter 237 of the public laws of 1937 is hereby amended by striking out all of said section and inserting in place thereof, the following:

'Sec. 25. Hearings on applications for liquor licenses. The municipal officers, or in case of unincorporated places, the county commissioners of the county wherein such incorporated place is located, shall hold public hearing for the consideration of all applications for liquor licenses requiring their approval by law, after giving public notice at the applicant's expense, which shall be prepaid, by causing a notice, stating name and business address of the applicant and the time and place of hearing, to be printed for at least 6 consecutive days prior to the date of hearing in a daily newspaper published in the city or town in which the premises proposed to be licensed are situated; or, if no daily newspaper is so published, said notice shall be printed for the same period in a daily newspaper published in the county in which the premises are situated; or, if no daily newspaper is published in such town or county, then such notice shall be printed for 2 consecutive weeks prior to the date of hearing in a weekly newspaper published in the county.'
