STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED FORTY-ONE

AN ACT Relating to Headlights of Motor Vehicles.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 29, § 82, amended. The 3rd sentence of the 2nd paragraph of section 82 of chapter 29 of the revised statutes, as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

'If said vehicles can exceed a speed of 15 miles per hour, then they shall have front lamps capable of furnishing light of sufficient candle-power to render any substantial object clearly discernible on a level way at least 200 feet directly ahead and at the same time at least 7 feet to the right of the axis of such vehicle for a distance of at least 100 feet; provided that no front lamp capable of furnishing more than 4 candle-power light shall be used if equipped with a reflector, unless so designed, equipped, or mounted that no portion of the beam of light when projected 75 feet or more ahead of the lamps shall rise above a plane of 42 inches higher than and parallel with the level surface on which the vehicle stands; and provided, further, that, at no time, shall the top of any main beam of light be higher than the headlight centers; and provided, further, that no electric bulb or other lighting device of a greater capacity than 32 candle-power shall be used, no matter how the same may be shaded, covered, or obscured, except the seal beam unit, so-called, which is standard headlight equipment for motor vehicles.'
