STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED FORTY-THREE

AN ACT Regulating Employment of Females.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 54, § 21, amended. Section 21 of chapter 54 of the revised statutes, as amended, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 21. Females not to be employed more than 9 hours a day; minors under 16 years of age not to be employed more than 8 hours a day; exceptions. No female shall be employed in any workshop, factory, manufacturing or mechanical establishment more than 9 hours in any 1 day; except when a different apportionment of the hours of labor is made for the sole purpose of making a shorter day's work for 1 day of the week and except during the emergency created by the state of war between the United States and Germany and Japan; and in no case shall the hours of labor exceed 10 hours in any 1 day or 54 in a week. And no minor under 16 years of age shall be employed in any of the said establishments or occupations more than 8 hours in any 1 day.'
