IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED
FORTY-FIVE

AN ACT Relating to Police Pensions in City of Portland.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

P. & S. L., 1927, c. 75, § 1, amended. Section 1 of chapter 75 of the private and special laws of 1927, as amended, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

‘Sec. 1. Retirement pensions for police department provided for; conditions. The city of Portland is hereby authorized to provide, by ordinance, for the retirement, upon pension not exceeding half pay, **which may be increased, in like manner, as the wages of those holding or who have held like office are or have been increased,** of all the members of its police force, including the chief of police, deputy chief of police, captains, lieutenants, sergeants and patrolmen, who have been honorably discharged from the police force by reason of,

First: having served on said police force not less than 25 consecutive years, or

Second: having served on the police force not less than 20 consecutive years and having reached the age of 65 years, or

Third: having been permanently disabled in the performance of duty.’
