STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED FORTY-FIVE

AN ACT Relating to Police Officers for the Penobscot tribe of Indians.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. R. S., c. 22, § 320-A, additional. Chapter 22 of the revised stautes is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered 320-A, to read as follows:

'Sec. 320-A Police officers for Penobscot tribe of Indians. The commissioner is hereby authorized to appoint for a term of 1 year or at the pleasure of the commissioner a constable or constables for the Penobscot tribe of Indians. Such constable or constables shall have the same powers and duties as constables and police officers in towns and cities for the enforcement of the laws of the state within the limits of the reservation, with authority to take any offender before any court of competent jurisdiction, within his county. Such constable or constables shall receive \$3 per day and shall be on call at all times.'

Sec. 2. P. & S. L., 1885, c. 493, repealed in part. Chapter 493 of the private and special laws of 1885, as far as it may relate to a constable or constables for the Penobscot tribe of Indians, is hereby repealed.
