

STATE OF MAINE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 94th LEGISLATURE

SENATE AMENDMENT "A" to S. P. 294, L. D. 488, Bill, "An Act Creating the State Board of Education."

Amend said Bill by striking out the 1st paragraph of that part designated "Sec. 1-A" and inserting in place thereof the following underlined paragraph:

'Sec. 1-A. State board of education; expenses. The board shall consist of 10 members to be appointed as follows: One by the presidents of the liberal arts and teachers' colleges of the state, the appointee not to be an active college president; one by the Maine municipal association the appointee not to be the active president of the association; one by the Maine superintendents' association, the appointee not to be the active president of the association; one by the Maine congress of parents and teachers, the appointee not to be the president of the organization; one by the Maine teachers' association, the appointee not to be the president of the association; and 5 to be appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the council. The appointees shall take the oath of office prescribed The 5 members of the 1st board appointed by the for state officers. organizations listed in this paragraph shall by lot determine the member to serve for 1 year, 2 years, 3 years, 4 years and 5 years. Of the 5 members appointed by the governor, one shall serve for 1 year, one for 2 years, one for 3 years, one for 4 years and one for Regular appointments thereafter shall be for a term of 5 5 years. years. The governor and the organizations mentioned in this paragraph shall appoint successors to their first-term appointees to fill

unexpired terms or to serve regular terms, these appointments to be in accordance with the provisions for the 1st appointments. Members of the board shall be subject to removal from office by the governor and council for cause.'
