AN ACT Relating to the Taking of Clams in Scarboro.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 34, § 64, amended. Section 64 of chapter 34 of the revised statutes, as revised, is hereby amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 64. Licenses required to dig or take clams, etc., in Scarboro; definition. No person shall, in the town of Scarboro in the county of Cumberland, dig or take clams, clam-worms or bloodworms ~~for sale~~ unless license has been granted to him by the municipal officers of said town, who are authorized to grant and issue such licenses and fix the fee therefor. No license shall be granted or issued except to a resident of said town. Nothing herein shall prohibit any resident ~~or a riparian owner of shores or flats therein~~ from digging and taking clams for food for himself and family without license, ~~or shall prohibit a riparian owner of shores or flats in said town from digging and taking from his own shores or flats clams for food for himself and family.~~ For the purposes of sections 64 to 66, inclusive, the term "a resident" shall mean a person who has resided in this state for the term of at least 6 consecutive months and in the town of Scarboro for at least 3 consecutive months prior to receiving a license.'
