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### AN ACT Relating to Harrison Mutual Fire Insurance Company.

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Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows :

**P. & S. L., 1859, c. 287, § 1, repealed and replaced.** Section 1 of chapter 287 of the private and special laws of 1859, as amended, is hereby repealed and the following enacted in place thereof :

‘Sec. 1. Incorporation; authority to insure within state. Sumner Burnham, George Pierce, Silas Blake, Philander Tolman, Charles Thomes, Samuel Thomes, Benjamin F. Pierce, Amos P. Foster, Jonathan Whitney, Solomon L. Andrews, John E. Dunnels, John Dawes, Joshua Howard, Henry Roby, Stephen Blake, Edward K. Whitney, Albion K. Morse, Cyrus Haskell, Thomas R. Sampson, and all others who may hereafter become members of said company in manner herein prescribed, are hereby incorporated and made a body politic by the name of Harrison Mutual Fire Insurance Company, for the purpose of insuring in the town of Harrison only; provided, however, if the company so vote they shall have the right to insure in the manner hereafter described in any city, town, plantation or unincorporated place in the state, viz.: on dwelling houses, stores, shops, barns and other buildings and on household furniture, merchandise and other property against loss or damage by fire originating in any cause other than by design on the part of the assured, and for such other pur-

poses as are now or may be hereafter conferred on insurance companies by the provisions of section 25 of chapter 56 of the revised statutes of 1944 and acts additional thereto and amendatory thereof; also to purchase and hold such real and personal estate as may be necessary to effect the object of this association and to sell and convey the same at pleasure.'
