**AN ACT Relating to Allowance to Commissioned Officers for Maintenance
of Uniforms and Equipment.**

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 12, § 50, amended. Section 50 of chapter 12 of the revised statutes, as amended by section 19 of chapter 326 of the public laws of 1949, and by section 2 of chapter 266 of the public laws of 1951, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 50. Uniform of commissioned and warrant officers; uniform allowance; exemption from attachment and distress. All commissioned officers and warrant officers shall provide themselves with such uniforms, arms and equipment as are required of commissioned officers or warrant officers in their respective arms of service in the national military establishment, and the adjutant-general may purchase and issue as state property on memorandum receipt or sell for cash to commissioned officers and warrant officers such articles of arms, uniforms and equipment as he may deem necessary.

Each commissioned officer and each warrant officer who in a 12-month period immediately preceding the 1st day of July in each year shall have maintained and kept his prescribed uniforms, arms and equipment in proper

order shall annually on the 1st day of July be allowed and paid the sum of \$35 or a proportionately less sum for any less period of time.

The clothes, arms, military outfit and accoutrements furnished by or through the state to a member of the active militia and the uniforms, arms and equipment required of commissioned officers and warrant officers shall not be subject to any suit, distress, execution or sale for debt or payment of taxes.'
