# STATE OF MAINE

### IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED FIFTY-THREE

#### **RESOLVE**, Providing for a Deficiency Appropriation for Hospital Aid.

**Emergency preamble.** Whereas, the funds appropriated for hospital aid for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1953 were \$200,000 less than the funds provided for the prior fiscal year ending June 30, 1953; and

Whereas, reasonably adequate provisions for payments to the hospitals for service to patients qualified under the hospital aid laws are essential for the continued operation of Maine hospitals; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the legislature these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Hospital aid; appropriation for. Resolved: That the sum of \$200,000 be, and hereby is, appropriated to the department of health and welfare from the unappropriated surplus of the general fund for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1953, for additional aid to public and private hospitals. This supplemental appropriation shall be paid as though it had been available during the entire fiscal year ending June 30, 1953.

**Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve shall take effect when approved.

### STATEMENT OF FACTS

The general fund appropriation measures passed by the 95th legislature provided as follows for hospital aid:

1951-52	\$1,000,000
1952-53	800,000

The smaller appropriation for the current year reflected the lower general fund income estimates incident to the property tax repeal and did not indicate lower hospital costs or fewer hospital days.

The result of the \$200,000 reduction, 1952-53 over 1951-52 has been as follows:
