STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED FIFTY-SEVEN

AN ACT Prohibiting Throwing, Depositing and Dumping of Rubbish in Certain Places.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 137, § 32-B, additional. Chapter 137 of the Revised Statutes is hereby amended, by adding thereto a new section to be numbered 32-B, to read as follows:

'Throwing Rubbish in Certain Places.

Sec. 32-B. Throwing, depositing and dumping of refuse: penalty. If any person shall put or place, or cause to be put or placed, in or upon any highway, street, square, lane, alley, public bathing place or the approaches thereto, or into any public waters, streams or water course or other public place in any municipality any bottles, glass, crockery, cans, scrap metal, junk, paper, garbage, old automobiles or parts thereof or refuse of any nature whatsoever or any noxious thing, he shall be fined not more than \$25. Nothing in this section shall be construed as affecting authorized collections of such articles as garbage or refuse.

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions relative to the placing or throwing refuse or rubbish into any public waters or the approaches thereto or land bordering the same may in addition to the penalty provided in this section, lose his fishing or hunting license for 2 years, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Game.'
