IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED FIFTY-NINE

AN ACT Regulating Trucks Stopped on Highways to Load Pulpwood.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

R. S., c. 22, § 139-B, additional. Chapter 22 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding a new section to be numbered 139-B, to read as follows:

'Sec. 139-B. Parking upon highway to load pulpwood prohibited; exception. No person shall park any vehicle upon the paved, improved or main traveled portion of any way for the purpose of loading pulpwood, unless a clear and unobstructed width of not less than 10 feet is left upon the main traveled portion of the way opposite such vehicle for the passage of other vehicles. Whoever parks a vehicle on any way for the purpose of loading pulpwood shall, during such time as lights are not required, display red flags in the center of the lane of traffic occupied by the vehicle not less than 200 feet nor more than 300 feet from either side of the vehicle. During the time that lights are required, flares, lanterns or reflectors shall be used in place of flags. Any persons violating this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$200 nor more than \$500, or by imprisonment for not more than 11 months, or by both.'
