CHAPTER XXXV.

Resolve compensating Lothrop Lewis for certain services. *March 15, 1821.*

Resolved, That there be allowed and paid out of the Treasury of this State, to Lothrop Lewis, the sum of one hundred and five dollars, in full for his services and balance of expenses, as a Commissioner to conclude a Treaty with the Penobscot Tribe of Indians, pursuant to Resolve of the Legislature of June 20, 1820. And the Governor, with the advice of the Council, is hereby authorized and required to draw his Warrant on the Treasurer for the aforesaid sum.

CHAPTER XXXVI.

Resolve granting compensation to the Rev. Elijah Kellogg, Chaplain of the Senate, and to the Rev. Ichabod Nichols, Chaplain of the House of Representatives. *March 15, 1821.*

Resolved, That there be paid out of the Treasury of this State to the Rev. Elijah Kellogg, Chaplain of the Senate, and to the Rev. Ichabod Nichols, Chaplain of the House of Representatives, sixty dollars each, in full for their services during two Sessions of the Legislature; and that the Governor, with advice of Council, be requested to draw his Warrant on the Treasurer for the same.

CHAPTER XXXVII.

Resolve providing for the distribution of the Laws which are or may be printed by the present Legislature. *March 15, 1821.*

Resolved, That the editions of the Laws of this State, printed or to be printed by the authority thereof, which have been or may be enacted by the present Legislature, be distributed by the Secretary of State in the following manner, viz:—to the Clerk of each Town or Plantation which pays a State tax, one set, for the use of such Town or Plantation; to each Clerk of the Judicial Courts of this State, one set each, for the use of their respective Counties; to each Judge of the Supreme Judicial Court, one set; to the Judges of Probate in the several Counties, one set each, for the use of the office in said Counties; to the Sheriffs of the several Counties, one set each; to each Gaoler, one set; to the Attorney General and the several County Attornies, one set each; for the use of the Secretary's and Treasurer's office, one set; one set to the library of Congress; one set to the Legislatures of each of the United States; one set to the Governor; one set to each member of the Council, Senate and House of Representatives of the present Legislature; and one set each to the Secretary of the Senate, and Clerk of the House of Representatives.

Be it further Resolved, That upon the death, resignation or removal from office of either of the Clerks of the aforesaid Towns and

Plantations, or Courts of Law, Judges of Probate, Sheriff, Gaoler, Treasurer, Secretary, Attorney General, County Attornies, each of them respectively, his executors and administrators, shall be held and obliged to deliver over the same set, which shall have been received as aforesaid, to his and their successor or successors in office, for the use of their respective offices.

Be it further Resolved, That there be allowed the sum of twenty dollars to each of the Printers of newspapers within this State, who shall publish in their papers, the original Statute Laws, passed at the present session of the Legislature, together with such of the Laws as have been re-enacted, as the Secretary of State may direct.

CHAPTER XXXVIII.

Resolve establishing a Valuation for the State. *March 17, 1821.*

The Committee of both Houses, who were directed by a joint order of the Legislature, passed February 22, 1821, to make such alterations as they may find necessary, in consequence of any Polls and Estates being set off from one town and annexed to another; to correct and revise the same; and report a Resolve establishing a Valuation for the State, have attended to the duties assigned them, and report the following Schedule and Resolve, which are herewith respectfully submitted.
