Be it further enacted, That two undivided third parts of all lands reserved for the use of Reservation the ministry or for the use of the first settled minis- try & schools. ter, or for the use of schools in said Plantation No. 6, shall belong to the said town of Berlin, for the uses to which they were granted or reserved.

SECT. 3. Be it further enacted, That Ichabod Foster, Esq. a Justice of the Peace in the County of Oxford, or any other Justice of the Peace in said County, be, and he hereby is authorized to ^{First meeting,} call the first meeting of said inhabitants, by issuing his warrant to some one of said inhabitants, directing him to notify them to meet at such time and place as he shall appoint, to choose such officers as other towns are empowered to choose at their annual meetings.

CHAPTER CCXXXIV.

A DESCRIPTION OF A DESC

AN ACT additional to the "Act establishing a ministerial and school fund in Greene.."

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That Jairus Name correct-Phillips, whose name was by mistake inserted in the $\frac{ed of Jairus}{Phillips}$. Act to which this is additional as James Phillips, be and he is declared to be one of the trustees, incorporated by said act : and all acts and doings of the said Jairus Phillips, as trustee aforesaid, be, Confirmation and they are hereby confirmed and made valid in $\frac{of former}{doings}$. law, notwithstanding the mistake aforesaid.

STATUTE AT A STATE OF

CHAPTER CCXXXV.

AN ACT to incorporate the town of Kilmarnock.

SECT. 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That Boundaries of the Plantation number two, in the seventh range,

in the County of Penobscot, bounded east by Bridgton Academy land, and west by Milo, with the inhabitants thereof, be, and they hereby are incorporated into a town by the name of Kilmarnock. And the inhabitants of said town are hereby vested with all the powers, privileges and immunities which the inhabitants of towns within this State do or may by law enjoy.

SECT. 2. Be it further enacted, That any Justice of the Peace within said County is hereby empowered to issue his warrant to some inhabitant of said town, directing him to notify the inhabitants thereof, to meet at such time and place as he shall appoint, to choose such officers as other towns are empowered to choose at their annual town meetings.

SECT. 3. Be it further enacted, That, for the purpose of choosing a member of the House of Representatives in the Legislature of this State, the said town of Kilmarnock shall constitute a part of the same class in which it was placed previous to the passing of this act, and shall so continue until a new classification shall be made by provision of law.

CHAPTER CCXXXVI.

AN ACT to incorporate the town of Brownville.

SECT. 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That the Plantation number five, in the eighth range, in the County of Penobscot, bounded west by Williamsburg, south by Milo, east by number six, in the 8th range, and north by Boston township, with the inhabitants thereof, be and they are hereby incorporated into a town by the name of Brownville. And the inhabitants of said town are hereby vested with all the powers, privileges and immunities, which the inhabitants of towns within this State do or may by law enjoy.
