CHAPTER LIX.

Resolve in favor of Joseph Griffin.

Resolved, That there be allowed and paid out of the Treasury of the State, to Joseph Griffin, two hundred dollars, as an indemnity for losses sustained by him on his contract, made in the year 1821, with a committee of the Legislature, to print an edition of the Laws of the State; said losses baving occurred in consequence of necessary alterations of the terms of the contract, not foreseen by either of the contracting parties at the time when it was made. And the Governor, with advice of Council, is hereby authorized to draw his warrant on the Treasury for the sum aforesaid accordingly.

CHAPTER LX.

Resolve in addition to a Resolve apportioning the Representatives on the several Counties, Towns, Plantations and classes, on the first apportionment.

Resolved, That the Plantation known by the name of Passadunkeag, in the county of Penebscot, which is not by the Resolve "apportioning the Representatives on the several counties, towns, plantations and classes on the first apportionment," passed March 23d, 1821, included in any class, be, and shall be included in the class with Sebec, Williamsburg, Brownville, Kilmarnock, Milo, Maxfield and Blakesburg, otherwise called No. 1, 5th Range, and shall be entitled, accordingly, to vote in that class, for the choice of their Representative.

CHAPTER LXI.

Resolve granting compensation to the Chaplains of the Senate and House of Representatives.

Resolved, That there be allowed and paid out of the Treasury of this State, to Elijah Kellogg, Chaplain of the Senate, thirty dollars, for his services; and to Edward Payson, Ichabod Nich-
