east by Plantation number nine; and north by Plantations number ten and number thirteen, with the inhabitants thereof, be, and they hereby are incorporated into a town by the name of Whiting; and the inhabitants of said town are hereby vested with all the powers, privileges, and immunities, Powers. which the inhabitants of towns do or may by law enjoy.

Sect. 2. Be it further enacted, That any Justice

of the Peace, within said County, is hereby empow-First meeting, ered to issue his warrant to some inhabitant of said town, directing him to notify the inhabitants thereof, to meet at such time and place, as he shall appoint, to choose such officers as other towns are empowered to choose at their annual town meetings.

Sect. 3. Be it further enacted, That the said town of Whiting shall be entitled to a vote in the choice of a Representative to the Legislature of this State, in the same class, and in the same manner, Town to vote as it was allowed and authorized to do, previous to in the same the passing of this act; and shall continue a part of the class until otherwise provided by law.

CHAPTER CCCV.

AN ACT, in addition to "An Act to incorporate the town of Richmond,"

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That, from and after the first day of May next, the town of Richmond, shall not be holden to support, or contribute to the support of, any pauper, who resided within Town not holthe limits of the present town of Bowdoinham, on den to aid in the tenth day of February, one thousand eight hund-the support of certain paured and twenty three; but shall be holden to sup-pers. port all paupers who resided, on that day, within the limits of the town of Richmond; and the liabilities and obligations of each of said towns, in reference to all others who may become chargeable, shall be, and remain as if no special provision had been made in the act to which this is additional.
