CHAPTER CCCXXXIV.

AN ACT in addition to an Act to incorporate the Kennebec Steam Navigation Company.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled,* That the said Company be, and they are hereby authorized to divide their property into shares of not less than one hundred dollars each.

Company may divide their property into shares of not less than \$100 each.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted,* That the Act in addition to an Act to incorporate the Kennebec Steam Navigation Company, passed the tenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five, and so much of the third section of the Act to which this is additional, as is inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, be, and the same are hereby repealed.

CHAPTER CCCXXXV.

AN ACT to cede to the United States of America the jurisdiction of the Island or Rock called Mantinicus Rock, off Penobscot Bay; also a certain lot of Land on Pemaquid Point, in the town of Bristol.

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled,* That there be, and hereby is ceded to the

United States of America, the jurisdiction of the following described territory, situate within the State of Maine, viz.: The Island or Rock called Mantinicus Rock, sometimes called Wood-en-Ball Rock, on the coast of Maine, off Penobscot Bay, lying southeasterly of Mantinicus Island about five miles, containing by estimation about eight acres, more or less; also a certain lot of land on Pemaquid Point, in the town of Bristol, bounded as follows, viz.: beginning at the bank of the shore, at Mullikin's Cove, at the southerly corner of John Upham's land; thence north forty-four degrees east, twenty-five rods to a fence; thence east twenty-two degrees south, as the fence now stands, twenty-four rods to the bank of the shore; thence southwesterly round by the shore, to the bounds first mentioned, with the shore and privileges to high water mark, for the purpose of erecting Light Houses and Dwelling Houses, for the accommodation of the keepers thereof, on the said Mantinicus Rock, and point of land in the town of Bristol.

Concurrent juris-
diction reserved.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted*, That this State shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the United States, in, and over, the territory described in this Act, and the Houses when erected, so far as that all civil and military processes, issued under the authority of this State, or any officer thereof, may be executed on any part of the said granted premises, or in any building that may be erected thereon, in the same way and manner as if the jurisdiction had not been ceded as aforesaid.
