That said corporation shall be held to pay the Treasurer of the State the same amount of tax due from them as a Bank corporation, which they would have been liable to pay, had their capital stock been paid in at the time required by their charter.

CHAPTER CCCCXLII.

AN ACT to change the name of North-hill.

Name changed
to Brighton.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That, from and after the passing of this Act, the name of the town of North-hill, in the county of Somerset, shall cease, and the said town shall thereafter be called and known by the name of Brighton; but nothing in this Act shall be so construed as to impair the existing rights of said corporation.

CHAPTER CCCCXLIII.

AN ACT to incorporate the Trustees of the Charity Fund of Mount Vernon Chapter.

SECT. 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That Eleazer Wyer, Oliver Gerrish and Luther Richardson, their associates and successors be, and they hereby are, incorporated into a body politic, by the name of the Trustees of the Charity Fund of Mount Vernon Chapter, with power to prosecute and defend suits at law, to have a common seal, and to change the same; to make and put in execution any by-laws, for the management of their affairs, not repugnant to the laws of the State; to take and hold, for charitable and benevolent uses, any real and
