signed by the Treasurer of said Trustees and Manner in duly executed and acknowledged, by direction which conveyances shall be made of said Trustees, and under the seal of said corporation, shall be good and valid in law.

SECT. 8. Be it further enacted, That unless the said Trustees shall within three years from possession of the passing of this Act, be in possession of funds amount, within a or property for the use of said Academy, or this act to be void vested in a building for the same purpose, which, together shall amount to the sum of fifteen hundred dollars, and have also commenced instruction within that time, the powers granted

by this Act, shall be null and void.

SECT. 9. Be it further enacted, That Thomas Clark be, and he is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint the time and place for hold-First meeting, how called. ing the first meeting of said Trustees, and to give them personal notice thereof in writing, three days at least, prior to such meeting.

SECT. 10. Be it further enacted, That the powers granted by this Act may be enlarged, Powers restricted restrained or annulled, at the pleasure of the Legislature.

CHAPTER CCCCLXI.

AN ACT extending the Charter of the United Marine and Fire Insurance Company of Portland, for certain purposes.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That the United Marine and Fire Insurance Compa-charter extended ny of Portland, shall be, and continue a body poses. politic and corporate for the term of ten years, from the ninth day of February next; for the purpose of enabling said corporation to collect and adjust their debts; but not for the purpose of taking risks or making any fire or marine Insurance.
