CHAPTER CCCCLXII.

AN ACT to incorporate the town of Trescott.

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled,* That the Plantation called and known by the name of Number Nine, in the county of Washington, bounded northeasterly by Lubec, southeasterly by the Atlantic Ocean, and southwesterly by Whiting, be, and the same hereby is incorporated into a town by the name of Trescott.

Boundaries.

Provision for the choice of Representative.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted,* That until a new apportionment of Representatives shall be made, said town of Trescott, shall, for the purpose of choosing a Representative in the Legislature, be classed with the towns, whereof Denysville constitutes a part.

CHAPTER CCCCLXIII.

AN ACT to incorporate the St. Croix Steam Navigating Company.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled,* That Samuel Wheeler, William Vance, and George Downs, be, and they hereby are, together with their associates and successors, constituted a body politic and corporate, by the name of the Saint Croix Steam Navigating Company, with the privilege of navigating a boat or boats, to be propelled by steam engine or engines on the River Saint Croix, from Lubec to the head of navigation on said river, for the term of ten years from the passing of this Act: *Provided,* The said Wheeler, Vance and Downs, themselves or their associates, shall, during the time aforesaid, at all seasons, suitable for steam navigation, put and keep in operation, a steam boat of the burden of forty tons or more.

Persons incorporated,

with the privilege of navigating on certain waters for twenty years.

Proviso.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted*, That, for the purposes aforesaid, the said Corporation may take, have and hold any estate, real or personal, to any amount, not exceeding forty thousand dollars : and may invest, use, and dispose of the same, for their benefit, in the promotion of the objects of their incorporation, but not for any other purpose.

May hold estate,
&c.

SECT. 3. *Be it further enacted*, That said Corporation may, as such, prosecute and defend suits at law, and have and use a common seal, and make such by-laws for the convenient management of their affairs, as may not be repugnant to the laws of the State.

May prosecute &
defend; make by

SECT. 4. *Be it further enacted*, That the powers granted by this Act, may be enlarged, restrained or annulled, at the pleasure of the Legislature.

Powers restricted

SECT. 5. *Be it further enacted*, That either of the persons named in the first section of this Act, may call the first meeting of the corporation, at such time and place, as may be deemed expedient, giving reasonable notice thereof.

CHAPTER CCCCLXIV.

AN ACT to incorporate the Kennebunk Water Power Manufacturing Company.

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled*, That William Hill, Samuel Sneling, Jr. J. N. Sherburne, J. W. Mellen, Benjamin Smith, Barnabas Palmer, Joseph Moody, Joseph Porter, Joseph G. Moody, and Timothy Frost, their associates and successors, be, and they hereby are constituted a corporation, by the name of the Kennebunk Water Power Manufacturing Company, for the purpose of carrying on the manufacture of Cotton, Wool and Iron, and such other branches as may be conveniently connected
