seven, be, and the same hereby are extended to the towns of Alexander and Baileyville; and the fish committees of the towns last aforesaid shall have like powers with the committee of Charlotte, Baring, Cooper, and number Fourteen—and the towns of Alexander and Baileyville at their annual meeting in the month of March or April, may choose such committee consisting of three persons for each town.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted,* That during the season for the fish to descend down Denny's river and Pinmaquan, the fishways on said rivers shall be kept open, and any person or persons hindering or obstructing the passage of said fish through the same, during the time aforesaid, shall forfeit and pay the penalty imposed in the second section of an Act regulating the fishery on said streams passed February third, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-four, to be recovered by any individual of the fish committee of either of the towns named in this Act, or by any inhabitant of the town or plantation where the said offence shall have been committed, in an action of debt, in any court competent to try the same, to the use of the person who shall prosecute and sue therefor.

CHAPTER DLVIII.

AN ACT to set off part of the town of Foxcroft, and annex the same to Township numbered Seven, in the eighth range.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That so much of the town of Foxcroft, as lies north and westerly of Sebec Pond, be, and hereby is set off from the town of Foxcroft and annexed to Township numbered Seven in the eighth range, in the county of Penobscot: *Provided,* That the public

lands, belonging to the town of Foxcroft, thus set off, shall be exempt from taxation so long as they shall remain public property.

CHAPTER DLIX.

AN ACT establishing the line between Jefferson and the towns of Washington, Waldoborough, New-Castle and Alna.

Boundaries established.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That the dividing line between the town of Jefferson and the towns of Washington, Waldoborough, New-Castle and Alna, shall be as follows, viz: Beginning at a spruce tree in the Plymouth line, at the southwest corner of the town of Washington, and on the north line of the town of Jefferson, thence running south sixty degeees east, two and an half miles on the line between Jefferson and Washington to a hemlock tree marked “Ball town corner, 1805”; thence south seven degrees west two hundred rods to a stake in the roots of a white maple tree in Waldoborough north line; thence west northwest two hundred and twenty rods on the Waldoborough line to an ash stake, being the northwest corner of the town of Waldoborough; thence south twenty three and an half degrees west, on the west line of Waldoborough, eleven hundred and sixty rods, to a pine stump and several small marked birch trees, being the northeast corner of the town of Nobleborough; thence, beginning at a stake and stones on the west side of Damariscotta Pond, near the line between Zacheus Hatch, Junior, and land formerly in possession of Isaac Hall, being the established corner of New Castle, and northwest on the north line of the towns of New Castle and Alna, to a tree on the west side of Turner’s brook, so called, being the southwest corner of Jefferson, and the
