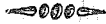

the direction of the Selectmen of the town in which said burying ground is situated, in erecting and repairing such fence. And the duties and liabilities of such Selectmen in relation thereto, shall be the same as are provided by the second section of "An Act providing for the protection of grave yards," passed the twenty-fifth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight.

## CHAPTER CCCCXXI.

An Additional ACT respecting Banks.

*BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That the second and fourth sections of "an additional Act respecting Banks," passed the twenty third day of February, one thousand eight hundred and twenty seven, shall not be construed or considered to be in force until the first day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty one, at which time they shall be in full force and effect, any thing in said act to the contrary notwithstanding.*

[Approved by the Governor, February 20, 1829.]
