CHAP. 22.

Resolve in favor of Edward Williams

Approved February 18, 1829.

RESOLVED, That the sum of one hundred and seventy dollars and forty five cents be allowed and paid to Edward Williams, in full for his account for materials and labor in making a fence upon the State lot in Augusta, and the Governor, with advice of Council, is authorized to draw his warrant on the Treasurer for said sum.

CHAP. 23.

An additional Resolve respecting certain settlers of the Public Lands, passed the twenty fifth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five.

Approved February 18, 1829.

RESOLVED, That all the powers and authority given to the Land Agent, and all the rights and privileges granted to the settlers by the Resolve to which this is additional, be, and the same are hereby extended to the first Wednesday of January, which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty and no longer; subject however to the conditions and restrictions in the Resolve aforesaid.

IN SENATE, February 13, 1829.

The Committee on the State Prison and criminal code in attending to the duties assigned them, have had under consideration the accounts of Joel Miller, Esq. Warden, and of the prison in general, and ask leave to **REPORT** :

That they have examined the Warden's accounts contained in a Day Book, Journal and Leger, and carefully compared the same from the first day of September to the thirtieth day of November, 1828 inclusive, and they would remark in general, that they appear to be correctly kept and properly vouched. But in examining the items they find many of the articles purchased for the use of the Prison to have been obtained in small quantities and at retail prices, and when purchased in larger quantities, were bought on credit and at higher prices than they might have been obtained for, had they been paid for at the time of purchase.
