of specimens in Natural History and Mineralogy, and for such other literary or scientific purposes, and in such manner, as to said corporation may seem expedient.

First meeting.

SECT. 3. *Be it further enacted*, That the first meeting of said corporation may be called by any three of the persons named in this Act, by giving reasonable notice of the time and place appointed for such meeting, in some public newspaper, printed in said Bangor.

Powers herein granted may be enlarged or annulled by the Legislature.

SECT. 4. *Be it further enacted*, That the powers granted by this Act, may be enlarged, restrained or annulled, at the pleasure of the Legislature.



CHAP. 83.

AN ACT to annex Thompson Pond Plantation to the towns of Otisfield and Poland.

Approved March 8, 1830.

Description of territory set off to Otisfield.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled*, That from and after the passing of this Act, so much of Thompson Pond Plantation, in the county of Cumberland, as lies northwest of Thompson Pond, be, and hereby is annexed to the town of Otisfield, in said county; and the inhabitants thereof shall there exercise and enjoy all the rights and privileges of, and be subject to the same duties and requisitions as the other inhabitants of said town of Otisfield.

Territory set off to Poland.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted*, That from and after the passing of this Act, so much of said Thompson Pond Plantation as lies northeast of Thompson Pond, being the residue of said Plantation, be, and hereby is annexed to the town of Poland; and the inhabitants thereof shall there ex-

ercise and enjoy all the rights and privileges of, and be subject to the same duties and requisitions as the other inhabitants of said town of Poland.



CHAP. 84.

AN ACT ceding to the United States the Jurisdiction of a certain tract of land in the town of Boothbay.

Approved March 8, 1830.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled,* That there be, and hereby is ceded to the United States, the jurisdiction of a lot of land containing nine acres and twenty rods, situated in the town of Boothbay, for the purpose of erecting thereon light-houses, and any other buildings which may be found expedient by the government of the United States; said lot is bounded as follows, viz. beginning at a stake and stones standing on the bank of the bay on the westerly part of the cove, on the southeasterly side of Hendrick's head, so called; thence north twenty degrees west eleven rods to a stake and stones; thence north fifty degrees west to Sheepscott River, to a fir tree marked; thence southerly to the extreme part of said head, by the river; thence northerly, by the shore of the bay to the bounds first mentioned.

Boundaries of land ceded.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted,* That this State shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the United States in, and over the territory described in this Act, and the houses, when erected, so far, as that all civil, military or criminal processes issued under the authority of this State, or any officer thereof, may be executed on any part of the said granted premises, or in any building that may be erected thereon, in the same way and manner as if the jurisdiction had not been ceded as aforesaid.

Concurrent jurisdiction, reserved.
